Carpénè Malvotti Conegliano Valdobbiadene Prosecco Superiore n.v. (\$19)

I've been drinking a good deal of Prosecco, some very good, some mediocre, and this one from the superior Valdobbiadene region, where acreage is now sky-high in price, is one of the best for the amount of flavor without sweetness, marked "very dry." I sip it before dinner with just about everything from Ritz crackers to foie gras and am never disappointed, and everyone likes it when I pop the cork on this sparkler.
