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## Wine Reviews: Prosecco

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I've written about Prosecco several times in the past, and I'm back again to highlight some wines that may make you rethink this region. There's a maze of supermarket big brands and mass-produced wines, sure, but if you dig a bit deeper, there are some good ones to discover.

The best wines come from the hills in the Valdobbiadene appellation, as they tend to show much more mineral, chalky, flinty tones with more verve and brightness. And even as you move up tiers of quality, the price points tend to stay highly reasonable. Some folks may still look down on Prosecco as mass-produced brunch stuff, but there are some wines out there filled with character. When it comes to bubbles, I'm a Champagne guy through and through, but there are a few wines in this report that I would rather drink than some of the big house, widely-available Champagnes that run at least twice the price. These wines were received as trade samples and tasted sighted.
