Prosecco Hills Of Italy Named UNESCO World Heritage Site

It's time to celebrate with a glass of sparkling Prosecco or, if you prefer, an Aperol Spritz!

Culminating a lengthy nomination process that took over ten years, UNESCO finally declared the Prosecco Hills of Conegliano and Valdobbiadene a UNESCO World Heritage Site at the agency's recent meeting in Baku (capital of Azerbaijan).



This coveted designation safeguards the cultural landscape of a small agricultural area in northeast Italy, known principally for its Prosecco, notes Innocente Nardi, President of the Consortium for the Protection of Conegliano Vadobbiadene Prosecco DOCG, in a press release.

The UNESCO designation reads: The landscape is characterized by 'hogback' hills, ciglioni – small plots of vines on narrow grassy terraces – forests, small villages and farmland. For centuries, this rugged terrain has been shaped and adapted by man. Since the 17th century, the use of ciglioni has created a particular chequerboard landscape consisting of rows of vines parallel and vertical to the
